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Chair's update

Dear Resident,

As we now slowly move into shorter days and longer nights and begin to plan our Christmas celebrations, I thought rather than looking back over the last year, I would look beyond 2021 into 2022.

The Parish Council will, in 2022, be operating from its new Parish Office located next to the new Neighbourhood Centre. It's a purpose-built facility that has been provided to the community from funds allocated to the Parish Council from the housing development in Wickhurst Green.

The Parish Office will be for all council meetings and a place for residents to visit to get information and advice. The council has never had an office to operate from since its formation in 1987.

As the population of Broadbridge Heath has grown in size, so has the role and responsibilities of the Parish Council. Additional new play areas, allotments and green open spaces will be added to areas over which the Parish Council has responsibilities to maintain and develop for the benefit of the community.

The Council, both councillors and staff, are looking forward to providing the right level of service across all areas for which we have direct responsibility. The aspiration is to meet as much of the needs of residents as possible.

We are aware of some of the current challenges the community faces. Facebook, emails, and telephone calls are some of the ways that councillors and staff get some insight into the current issues that concern residents: antisocial behaviour, traffic calming, speeding and dog fouling to name a few. Hopefully, we do identify your concerns and work to try and find a resolution to them within the very limited powers granted to town and parish councils.

The question often arises as to what a parish council can actually deliver. It is natural to expect the council that is closest to the people, and which may be the first point of contact, to act but does it have the power and authority to respond effectively? Unfortunately, many of the current challenging issues are ones where the council is not able to directly respond and act.

Town and parish councils in West Sussex operate under the three-tier system of local government and understanding the different tiers of local government structures can often be confusing. Details of the areas of responsibility of each of the three tiers can be found on our website and page 3.

A local council is a universal term for community, village, neighbourhood, parish, and town councils. They are the first tier of local government and are statutory bodies. They serve communities and are elected by residents. They can raise their own precept (a form of council tax). Across England there are 10,000 local councils and 120,000 councillors who serve on these local councils.

I hope that this explanation of the Parish Council's role within the tiers will help explain why the Parish Council is unable to deal with many of the issues that residents may face. However, hopefully by liaising, signposting, and lobbying, we are able to find solutions that go some way to improving our residents' daily lives.

I, like my fellow councillors, look forward to meeting you face to face in 2022 at one of the Parish Council's monthly meetings that will be held in our new Parish Office. These meetings are normally held on the first Monday of every month, except in August, when there is no meeting.

Finally, may I, on behalf of the Parish Council, wish you a Happy Christmas and a secure and positive 2022.

Parish Council finance update



Precept

The precept is the amount of Council Tax requested by the Parish Council (PC) annually from Horsham District Council to fulfil its activities and services.

The precept requirement for 2022/23 has been approved by the Finance Committee and will be submitted to Horsham District Council after approval from Full Council. The precept for each household will increase by $\pounds 2.60$ for a band D property.

As always, the PC is keen to ensure that its priorities and initiatives reflect the wishes of the electorate. If you have any ideas or feedback, we would be most pleased to hear from you.

Also, don't forget that the Parish Council has a small fund for helping local organisations. Details of our grant policy and an application form can be found on our website.

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Update from Councillor David Trangmar, Chairman of the Finance Committee

Since 2012 the Parish Council element of Council Tax for a Band D property in the UK has risen by an average of 4.7% per year to $\pounds71.86$. In Broadbridge Heath we have kept the average rise to 2% per year, with a Band D parish council tax element of $\pounds52.08$ in 2021/22.

The UK wide increases in precepts are mostly as a result of the pressure on Parish Councils to provide more services to residents. In Broadbridge Heath, the Parish Council have introduced youth services and an Age UK agent, renewed play areas, contributed to the Village Centre enhancements, and improved other parish assets. We are also due to move into a new office and administer some new allotments and other green spaces in the near future.

We have been able to limit the increases to residents over this period with careful budgeting as the size of the village has increased, incorporating the maintenance contributions of the developers into our forecasts. In coming years, I anticipate that increases in the precept will need to align more with the national trends that we have seen elsewhere.

Annual accounts 2020/21

The Parish Council's annual accounts have been signed off by our external auditors and can be viewed on the PC's website under Annual Accounts.

New Councillors

The Parish Council welcomed 3 new members in July this year, when 3 new councillors were Co-opted to the Council: Sam Hazell, Debbie Lambert and Sarah Chandler.

Our local government consists of three tiers of authorities. The Parish Council is your local and lowest tier of local Government. It is formed of 13 Councillors and represents the Community of Broadbridge Heath, making decisions on its behalf.

There are many other ongoing projects to pursue, whilst ensuring the day-to-day responsibilities and activities of the Parish Council continue.

Parish projects

Wildflower area

After the sowing of seed last Autumn, this year saw the first growth of wildflowers in the two wildflower areas at the downgraded bypass.



With consent from WSCC, our Grass Contractor regularly maintained a margin around the perimeter of the area and cut a winding path through the wildflowers. We know the path and flowers were enjoyed by residents with many butterflies and other insects, birds and even a slow worm spotted!

In early October the area had a hard cut and the vegetation was removed. The cut vegetation is removed to avoid a build-up of nutrients in the soil as wildflowers grow best in poor soil and without the competition from rank grasses.

The sowing of wildflower seeds in this area was a first for BBHPC; thank you to David Bridges for his continued support and to the Wilder Horsham District Project for their advice.

The Parish Council is looking forward to seeing what grows back next year and will closely monitor to consider the appropriate maintenance needs for the area.

Other work and progressions in the village this year include:

- A new picnic bench installed at Charrington Way Recreation area
- Top Common improvements including annual maintenance and the development of an Interpretation Board to be installed soon!
- Spring bulb planting at the Common
- A Throwline, new fence, and Duck sign at the Ducky, also an ecological survey of the pond for future discussion by the Council



- 2 new Dog-Bag dispensers installed at the Common and the one at Charrington Way moved nearer to the path
- Hanging Baskets
- Street Poppies
- HDC have been contracted to empty the village bins since the Summer and a deep clean of the Ducky play equipment and benches was carried out
- Tree works in the village were completed as identified in the Tree Survey
- General maintenance of PC assets and Grass Cutting

This list isn't conclusive but is a snippet of work and ongoing projects for the village.

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The Triangle Area Landscaping Project

The Triangle landscaping project (pictured left) commenced late November and we hope the first couple of phases may be complete as this Newsletter reaches your home. This is the area that corners Billingshurst Road and Old Guildford Road.

This project was delayed from last year but has been funded by CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funds linked to the new developments in the village.

Updates have been previously shared on our Facebook page and nearby homes informed.

The project will see a new Wildflower seeded area, but with the seed to be sown next year. The hedge to the rear of the area has unfortunately died and will be removed but replaced with some Photinia Red Robin hedge plants that will grow over time. Overhanging vegetation will be cut back to ensure full access to the adjacent footpaths.
